Venues and submission guidelines

(1) National, general interest publications

- The New York Times: for both The Opinionator (general) and The Stone (philosophyspecific), submit to opinion@nytimes.com. 400-1200 words suggested.
- *Slate*: send to <u>slateoffice@slate.com</u> with "Article Submission" in subject line.
- *HuffPost*: go to http://www.huffingtonpost.com/contact/ and click the link under the heading "Send us a blog pitch," which takes you to a Google form where you can submit a 500-1000 word blog post.
- The Atlantic: send manuscript or pitch to submissions@theatlantic.com
- *The New Yorker*: does not accept unsolicited nonfiction pitches.
- Salon: email submission; address depends on the section you're submitting under (e.g., life, culture, politics). Guidelines here: http://www.salon.com/about/submissions/
- Boston Review: submit at https://bostonreview.submittable.com/submit

(2) Local newspapers

- *Boston Globe*: op-eds send to <u>oped@globe.com</u>, 700 word maximum. Letters send to <u>letter@globe.com</u>, 200 word maximum.
- Boston Herald: send letters and op-eds to letterstoeditor@bostonherald.com
- Cambridge Chronicle: send to cambridge@wickedlocal.com
- Many national and large city papers are listed on the Op-Ed Project page (link above). These
 often accept articles from outside the city in question, and sometimes outside the state.
- *Small city and town "local" papers* are a good venue for residents. They look for local-focused stories and reflections and it is easy to get a letter accepted. A few are listed in the Op-Ed Project page (link above), but you should check with your local paper for their particular guidelines.

(3) Popular academic publications

- *Chronicle of Higher Education*: accepts submissions in several categories; see http://www.chronicle.com/page/Submissions/638. Send 1000-1200 word op-eds to opinion@chronicle.com; send 350 word max letters to letters@chronicle.com.
- Times Higher Education: guidelines at https://www.timeshighereducation.com/news/writing-for-times-highereducation/418274.article. (Word limits and guidelines differ for features, opinion pieces, and blog posts). Send submissions to THE.Submissions@tesglobal.com.
- Aeon: does not accept unsolicited pitches, but says "if you are an academic who would like to get in touch with one of our commissioning editors directly, please email editorial@aeon.co and provide us with a short bio and a link to your faculty page or website."
- *The Conversation*: only accepts submissions from authors with academic affiliations. Submit a pitch at https://theconversation.com/become-an-author; guidelines for submissions at https://theconversation.com/us/introduction.
- 3:AM Magazine: guidelines at http://www.3ammagazine.com/3am/submissions/. Submit to submissions@3ammagazine.com. They advise mentioning a relevant editor; the editors for philosophy are Richard Marshall (senior) and Mark de Silva (junior).
